Joseph G. Dierckman, age 91 of Batesville, Indiana, died Tuesday, March 11, 2014 at Margaret Mary Health. Born March 20, 1922 in Ripley County Indiana, he is the son of Ruth (Nee: Kirschner) and Edward Dierckman. He was a farmer and a member of Holy Family Church, Knights of St. John Commandery #220 and an Army veteran during WWII. Joe enjoyed following college basketball. In addition to his parents, he is preceded in death by his sisters Dolores Reer and Roberta Brunsman; brothers Milton and Elmer Dierckman. Visitation is Thursday, March 13th, from 4 – 7 p.m., at the funeral home. Funeral services are 10 a.m., Friday, March 14th, at Holy Family Catholic Church in Oldenburg, Indiana, with Rev.
